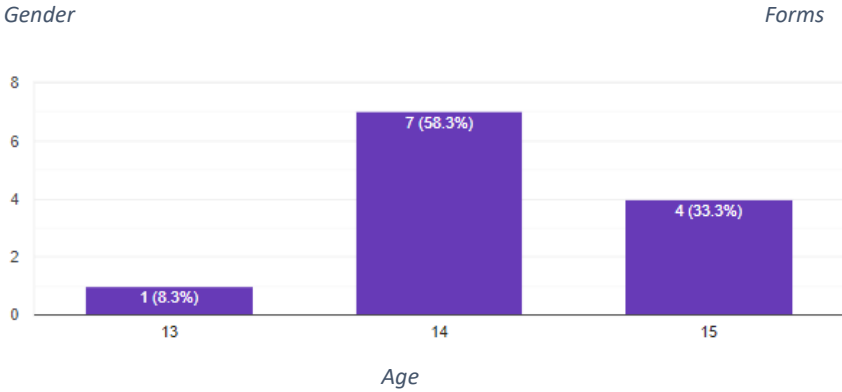
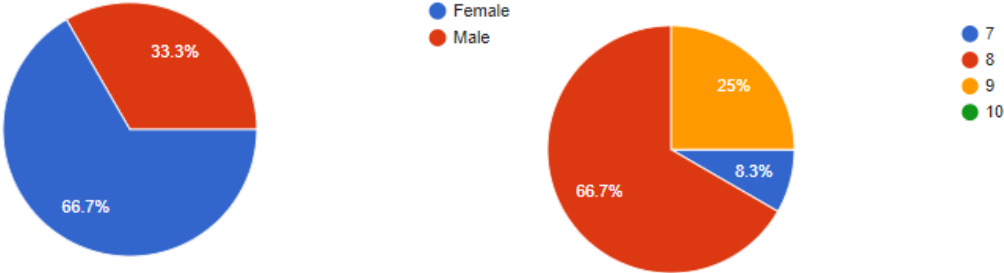


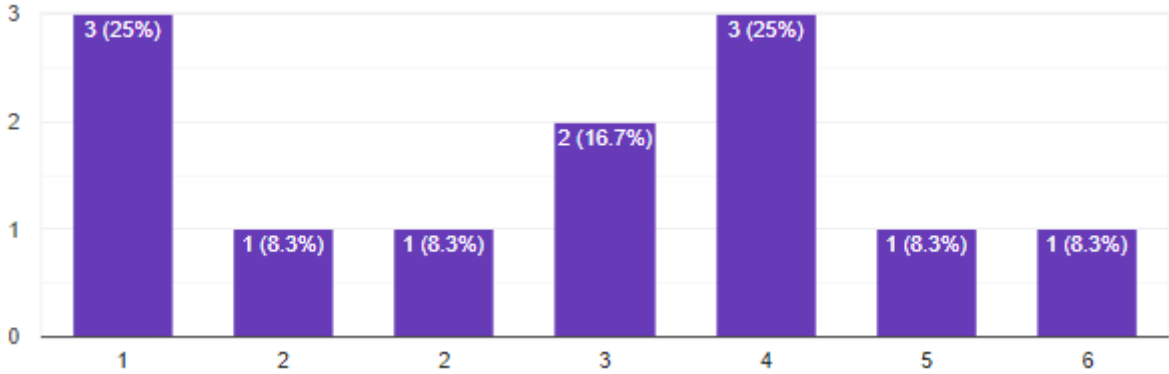
Summary of Students' Answers to the Questionnaire

12 students have answered the questionnaire – four boys and eight girls.

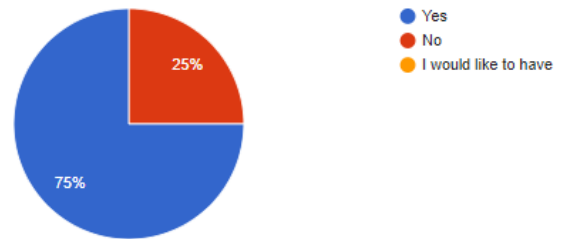
There are seven students aged 14, four students aged 15 and one 13 years old student, from form 7 to form 9.



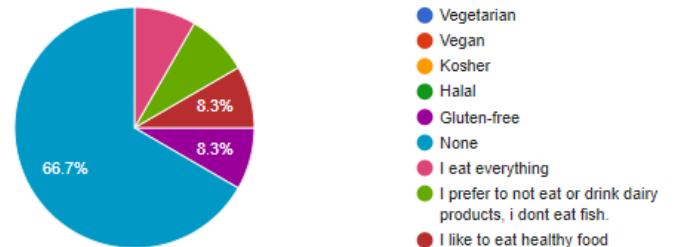
Most of them have brothers or sisters. As an only child in a family there are three students.



Eight students have **pets**. Mostly cats and dogs but also two students have also a bit different pets – one has got a bird and a chinchilla, another has a turtle, an albino frog and an axoloti. Three students do not have any pets.

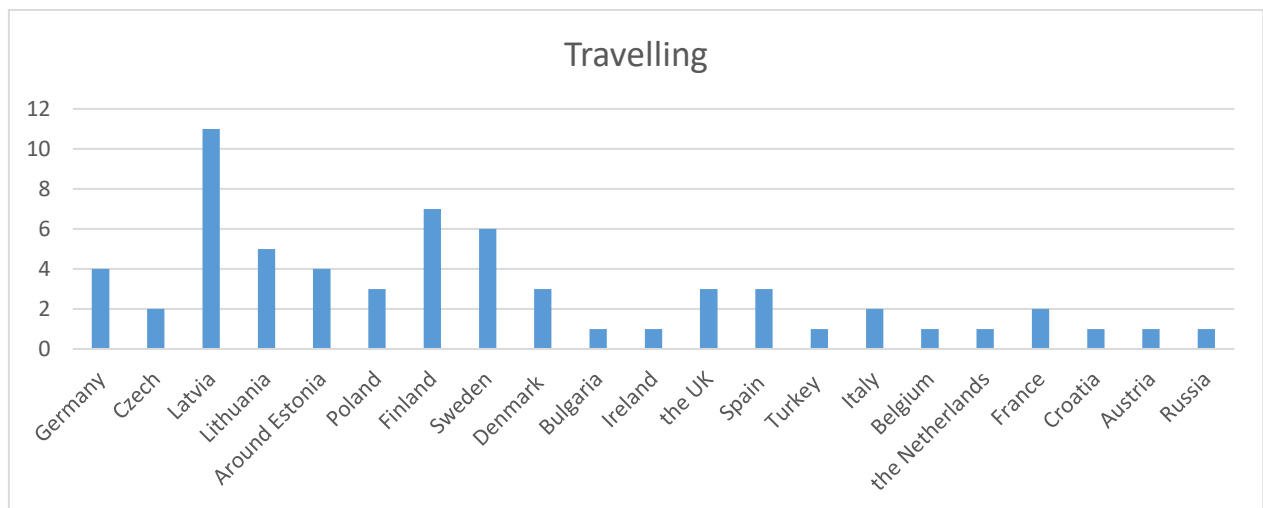

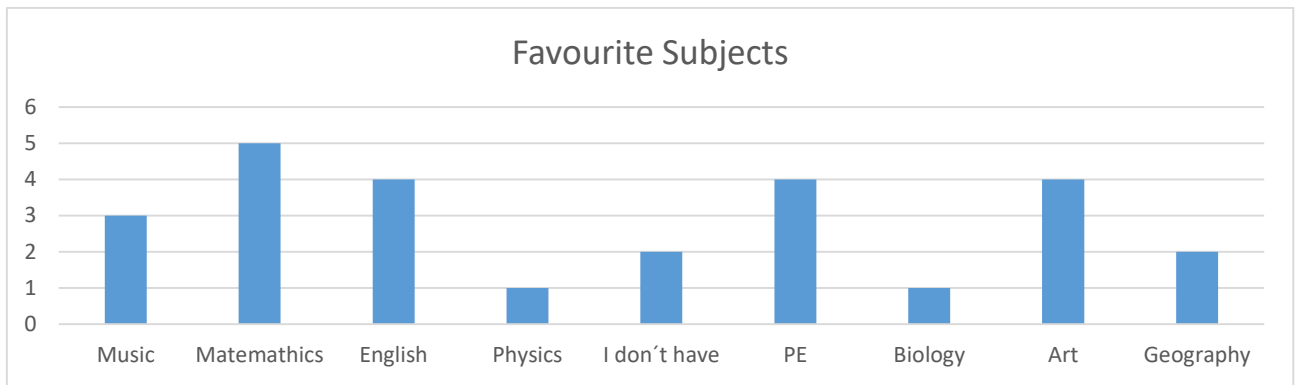


All of them **can speak** Estonian. Four students can speak a little Russian and two students can speak German.

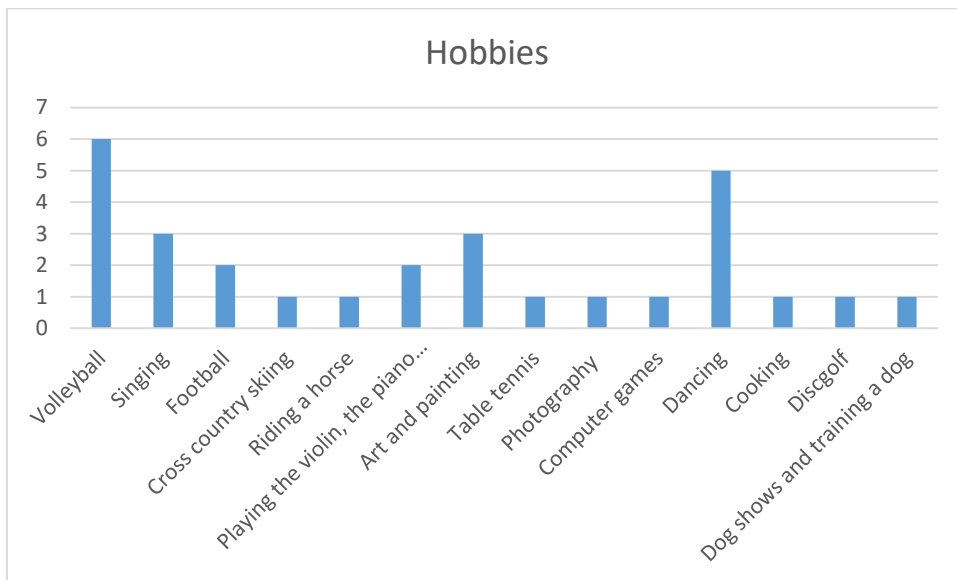

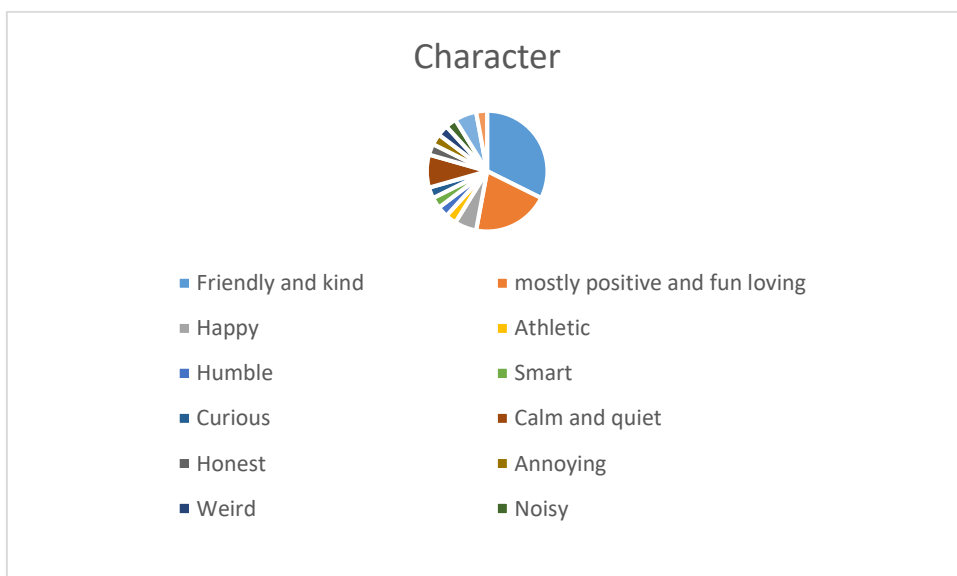

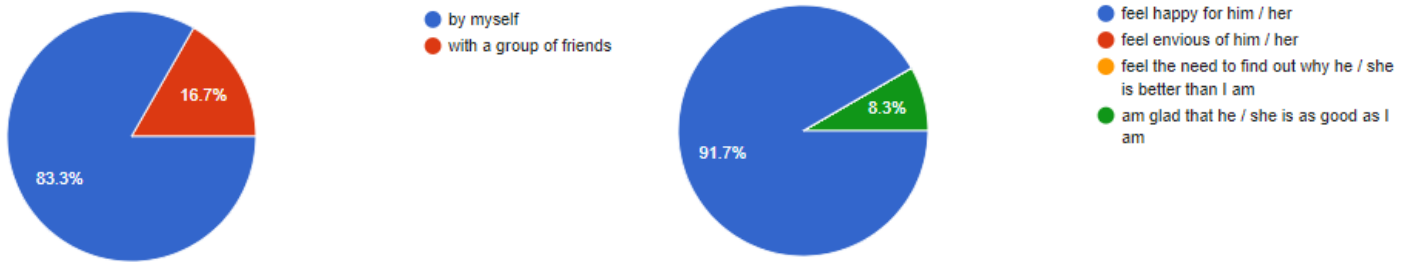
The most popular hobby among students is playing volleyball and dancing. Also, three of 12 like singing and art. Two students go to the music school and two of them play football, too. Other hobbies that were mentioned were skiing, riding a horse, playing table tennis or discgolf, photography, playing computer games, cooking, training a dog.



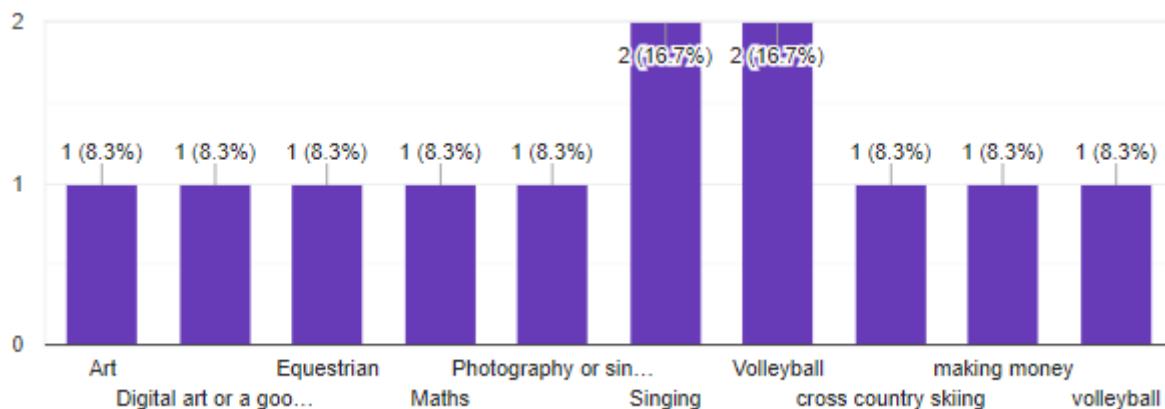
The students involved in the exchange programme find themselves to be friendly and kind, mostly positive and love fun.



When **learning for a test** they prefer to learn by themselves and when a classmate gets a good mark they feel happy for him/her.



If it were possible to choose to **be good at** something, the students would choose from art or sport.



Seven students find **their friends** are similar to them – they like the same things. Four students find their friends be different compared to them. One student has not thought about it.

Students mentioned that **a good leader** must be self-confident, courageous and decisive. He/she must think about others and cannot be selfish. It is important to listen to others and be kind but also stay strict.



Reasons why students have chosen **to take part of the exchange programme** to see the world and meet new people, to learn about different cultures and practice languages, to have a new experience/ a challenge, because they haven't been to Germany before and it is interesting/ cool.

Students **wish their host families** to be friendly and kind with a sense of humour, supportive and welcoming. They hope that the host family help them to have a memorable time. It would be nice if they had time together to visit some adventurous places, look around the city and see local sights, try German food, play together board games. It would be cool to experience their everyday life.

Thing in Germany are cheap

A challenge that students may face during the exchange programme:

- Getting anxious
- Some sleeping problems
- That can't understand what is said
- Don't know what to talk about

Students **expect their teachers** just to be there in need, to help with language if students can't understand what is said, or with pronunciation, to give some confidence. Some students do not know what can be done by teachers to help them.

During the exchange programme students **expect to learn** about German school and culture. They want to improve their language skills but also their cooperative skills, leadership skills, organisational skills. In addition they hope to improve their personal skills like flexibility, self-confidence and open-mindedness.
